Fellow Tribesman,

A year ago the Tribe of Golden Eagle gave me the honor to be your 2008 Presiding Chieftain at the Dane G. Hansen Scout Reservation. I am very humbled to be chosen for this position. Our tribe has countless members that are worthy of this honor and I still am amazed that it was given to me. I am very proud to be a part of such an awesome group of people. The ideals of the Tribe are very important to me and I hope are just as meaningful to all of you.

I was given the opportunity at the three closing fires last year to speak. I reminded everyone gathered, to remember the four resolutions given to all members. These four hearts resolutions are given to the newest foxmen for the first time on the night they are tapped. I hope the new braves have remembered the resolutions not simply as words spoken at the ceremony, but take them to heart and understand the full meaning of them. Each brave returning to our reservation should think to themselves, and ask the question, have I fully understood and am I living these resolutions? I also challenge all other members of our tribe to remember the resolutions that were given to them at the time they were tapped and ask themselves if they too are they living up to them. These resolutions are not for camp only but should be carried out the entire year. It is our responsibility as tribal members to set the example for younger tribesmen.

The 2008 camping season was a good one for all three sessions. I will never forget the Thursday night fire first week. I don't think I have ever seen a more beautiful night in all my years at Camp Hansen. The fireflies were out in full force and they lit the ceremony grounds up like I have never seen. Third week was not as lucky as we had a good ole Camp Hansen storm and had to hold ceremonies in the dining hall. We witnessed many advancements throughout the summer and were honored with the elevation of the first female Medicine Woman in the tribe. We saw the result of much hard work and effort put forth

by tribesmen all summer. The service projects done at Camp Hansen will benefit our camp for many moons to come.

Once again it is time to be thinking about returning to Camp Hansen for the 2009 season. Now is the time to take a look at your personal life and ask, am I ready for the summer and have I prepared myself by making advancement in scouting? If not there is still time to do so before returning to camp.

I invite everyone to attend Potlatch in May. This year promises to be better than ever with the addition of a Pow Wow in the weekend. The anticipation of elevating a tribesman to Chief awaits us all. Adult orientation (all adult stations)

3:00 until 5:00
Introduction to Costume building
Advanced Costume building
Fan making

We are giving training for all paint stations. There is also an orientation meeting for all adults so you can learn what each paint station does. Many of us know that there are Keepers of the Sacred Bundle but few of us know what their job is. This session will help to clear any confusion and answer questions you may have. These sessions will not replace anything that we do during summer camp but it will give you a chance to get a head start on camp. When you and your troop register for Potlatch we would like to know your GE rank so we can plan what classes will be full and how many trainers will be needed. At 3:00 there will be several costume building classes. If you need to start your costume or you want to learn how to build a back bustle we will have classes for you. Here you will not have time to complete a costume but you will know what you need to do between Potlatch and summer camp.

Potlatch

The Council of Chieftains has instructed the Tom-Tom Beaters to send forth the call to all Tribesman of Golden Eagle to gather at the Hansen Reservation for the annual Tribal Potlatch.

What is Potlatch? Among the Native Americans of the North-western Coastal Area, a Potlatch was a ceremonial festival marked by a large feast and the giving of gifts. In a show of sacrifice, tribal members achieved their social standing, not by what they had accumulated to themselves, but by what they were willing to give to others. In the spirit of the Potlatch, the Chieftains have proclaimed a festival, so that all tribesman of Golden Eagle might be allowed to share their gifts with others.

What do I share? The Golden Eagle Potlatch is, first of all, a day of service. All Tribesmen can give of their labor and physical skills to prepare Camp Hansen for the coming summer. This is a gift which costs nothing but benefits all those "younger and weaker" who will be trodding Camp Hansen trails this summer. Secondly, it is possible for a Golden Eagle to make a small sacrifice gift of "wampum." All money received will be used to fund the Golden Eagle program at camp, assist in the general program expenses of Scout camp, or be added to the Campership Fund which helps needy Scouts attend camp. Finally, a third way you can share as a tribesman is to donate articles for resale, at auction or in the trading post. Donated articles may include old Scout items, books, turkey feathers, leather,

cow horns, Indian Costume articles your imagination is the only limit. Again, the purchase of those donated items will aid in the funding of Camp Hansen programs.

What else happens at the Potlatch? Golden Eagle members will meet in their paint stations to receive instructions and prepare for the ceremonies for this coming summer. There will be special meetings of the Tribal Council and Manhawka Council.

What about food? Lunch and the evening Feast will be served in the Camp Hansen Dining Hall. Those who arrive on Friday evening, Saturday morning or stay Sunday need to provide for their other meals.

How much does the Potlatch cost? The Potlatch registration fee for participants is \$12 if paid by April 25, after this deadline it is \$17. This includes a light lunch, the Tribal Feast and a special Potlatch patch. We really need to know how many Tribesmen will be attending so we can purchase the right amount of supplies and food.

Can non-members of Golden Eagle participate? Yes, all Scouts and Leaders can come and share their resources and service. Paying the registration fee permits all to share in the Tribal Feast and receive the Potlatch patch. Non-tribesmen will not participate in the afternoon meetings but the evening ceremony is open to everyone.



The KEEPER OF THE PLAINS is the highest award a Tribesman can be given. This award is a bronze medallion which can be worn with the Tribesman's costume.

YOU CAN ADVANCE IN RANK THIS SUMMER, EVEN IF YOUR TROOP DOES NOT ATTEND!

That's right, you can advance even if your troop is not in camp. You must attend for the full week. As a member of the Tribe of Golden Eagle, you are asked to provide service to your camp. You can provide this service several ways: 1) attend with your troop, work on merit badges and other camp programs and advance that week; 2) attend with another troop, work on merit badges and other camp programs and advance that week; or 3) attend as a Counselor-in-Training (you attend free) and work with the camp staff for a week and advance. If you choose to be a C-I-T, you can not earn merit badges, etc., but you can advance in Golden Eagle and be part of a great camp staff helping a lot of Scouts and leaders.

Each week there are troops attending camp that have taken Scouts from other troops to camp. There are three weeks of camp: June 7-13, June 14-20, and June 21-27. KEEPER OF THE PLAINS :

The Keeper of the Plains is the highest recognition honor that the Tribe of Golden Eagle can bestow on one of its members.

SELECTION

*Any tribesman of Golden Eagle in good standing is eligible to receive this award regardless of tenure, rank or paint status.

*The Keeper of the Plains recipients , at their discretion, may annually present this recognition to a member of the Tribe of Golden Eagle.

*The Keeper of the Plains recipients determines the process for deciding who will receive this award.

*The committee should make their selection at the annual meeting of the Council of Keepers. Their decision is kept secret until the ceremony of presentation.

*While limited to one award each year, the Keeper of the Plains recipients may decide not to present a Keeper of the Plains. (In which case, it is possible to hold it over and use in a succeeding year.)

*Anyone may make a nomination for Keeper of the Plains by giving a nomination to a member of the award selection committee or the Directing Medicine Man. The Keeper of the Plains recipients may choose from nominated tribesmen or make their own nominations and selection.

*The award is presented in recognition of outstanding contributions to Golden Eagle, Camp Hansen, and in the promotion of Coronado Area Council summer camping opportunities.

*Holders of the "Keeper of the Plains" award will meet at a time and place determined by the Chief or his appointed representative, to determine appropriateness of awarding the "Keeper" to a member of the Council of Chieftains. Chieftains selected do not count against the yearly quota. Presentation of the "Keeper" to a Chieftain may occur during the weekly ceremonies during camp.
